Dear Paula & Lance.

The role of the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) is to prepare and respond to emergencies. Every city and town has an Emergency Management Director. For Somerville, that EMD is listed as Deputy Chief Charles Breen, of the Fire Department. When there is the potential for severe weather, MEMA rates the risk to public health and safety and sends "Situational Awareness" statements to public officials, on a regular schedule after 10 am morning and 4 pm afternoon briefings. The responsibility of the EMD, is to convey that information to city officials. Most of this information is also available to the general public, through any of the links below.

Below is the statement issued by MEMA on Wednesday, March 21, 2018 at 4:11:32 PM, following its afternoon briefing. This statement indicates that the Winter Storm Warning that had been issued on Wednesday morning, had been downgraded to a Winter Weather Advisory for Southeastern Middlesex County, ending at 8 am. The link to the National Weather Service, provides specific forecasts by zip code, which was 3-8 inches at 4 pm and 3-5 inches of snow for Somerville, as of 6:30 pm. This forecast was downgraded again at 10:05 pm to a Hazardous Weather Outlook and Wind Advisory, with a forecast of less than 1 inch of snow for Somerville.

At 7:30 pm on Wednesday, March 21, 2018, the Somerville Public Schools issued a statement cancelling school because "The most recent weather predictions are still calling for up to 8-10 inches of wet and heavy snow starting tonight and lasting through tomorrow mid-morning, which would make for dangerous roads, sidewalks, and travel conditions tomorrow."

It appears that the Somerville Public Schools is making its decisions about school cancellations, without relying upon the timely, official information that is provided to city officials. While this was clearly a changeable forecast, both MEMA and the NWS downgraded the storm over three hours before this cancellation. The SPS statement itself appears to be relying upon a "weather prediction" from somewhere other than the official source for Massachusetts cities and towns.

Can you please investigate how the Somerville EMD, or other city officials, convey MEMA storm warnings to the SPS? How and when does the SPS administration make a determination to cancel school? Finally, as many other parents are asking, how does the SPS decision-making interact with the City's determination to declare a snow emergency?

SUBJECT: Nor'easter Today into early Thursday

SITUATION:

The National Weather Service (NWS) is forecasting heavy snow, high winds, and minor to moderate coastal flooding today into Thursday, with heaviest precipitation in southeastern MA. Precipitation has begun over the Cape, and will slowly extend north and west, reaching Boston by 5 p.m. and northern MA/New Hampshire boarder by 10 PM. Accumulating snow will begin between 7 – 8 p.m. this evening, and last through 2 – 5 a.m. Thursday morning. Snow will then taper, and eventually end by mid-day Thursday, pulling out of Massachusetts from the southwest to the northeast. There is still some uncertainty in snowfall totals, especially north of the Mass Pike as marginal temperatures and dry air intruding into the region may lower snowfall amounts.

FORECAST:

Snow:

- •1-4 inches for western MA; 3-6 inches for central and northeastern MA; and 4-8 inches for Boston into southeastern MA (slightly higher amounts are possible in pockets of eastern MA and south of the Mass Pike). Precipitation types look to vary with a rain/snow mix across the Cape, with snow fall amounts of 1-2 inches.
 - Snowfall rates of 1 inch per hour are possible, especially during the overnight hours.
 - Heaviest snowfall leading to any travel impacts will be between 6pm and 2 AM Thursday morning.
 - Uncertainty remains for snowfall totals north of the Mass pike where dry air may reduce snowfall amounts. Greater confidence in totals south of the Mass pike.
 - Snow consistency will be on the wetter side, especially in southeastern MA, so there is the potential for some isolated power outages, however it will probably not be to the extent that we have seen with our past storms.

• Cape Cod, Martha's Vineyard, and southeast Middlesex County have been downgraded to a Winter Weather Advisory.

Wind:

- Northeast to north winds may gust to 45-55 mph along the immediate MA coast, and 55-60 mph on the Cape and Islands. Winds may gust to 25-35 mph farther inland across the remainder of the region.
- Winds will peak between 8 p.m. and daybreak on Thursday.
- Strong wind gusts along the may cause scattered power outages, especially in eastern MA and the Cape/Islands.

Coastal Flooding:

- Minor with pockets of moderate coastal flooding is likely during early Thursday AM high tide along the southeast MA coast.
- Overall expect widespread minor coastal flooding for the early Thursday morning high tide.
- The Coastal Flood Watch for the coastline south of Boston has been downgraded to a Coastal Flood Advisory.

Marine:

Dangerous marine conditions with storm-force winds and rough seas are expected.

Power Outages:

There is a potential for scattered power outages, especially in southeastern MA and coastal Plymouth county where 6-8 inches of heavy wet snow is expected, and winds will be strong.









End Time of Winter Weather Threats

Precipitation Ending Time Valid: Tonight into Thursday


