3. Grant of Location 207909 (ID:20735) Submitted by Eversource to install 29 feet of conduit in Rush St, from Utility Pole 302/3 to a point of pickup at 20-24 Rush St.

	The President opened the public hearing. Eversource representative Joanne Callender discussed the work to be completed. Councilor McLaughlin asked about impacts on traffic, and was told there would be a police detail present. With no other speakers, the President closed the public hearing. RESULT: APPROVED

4. Order 207910 (ID:20714) By City Councilor Ballantyne That the Director of Sustainability and Environment present the upcoming plan for Community Choice Electricity Aggregation.

Oliver Sellers-Garcia, Director of Sustainability and Environment, Philip Carr of Good Energy, and Anna Goldman, Randi Saltziac and Jessica Garrett of Mothers Out Front, all described Community Choice Electricity, a program that allows municipalities to select an electricity supplier to reduce costs and bring new renewable energy into the supply. In Somerville, the average household savings is \$145, and the renewable energy is from wind and solar power. Utilities are required to purchase increasing amounts of electricity from renewable sources, and estimates show that Somerville's consumption should be 50% clean by 2040. The Council discussed ways to support and expand the program.

The City has released an RFP for offsite parking for teachers, staff, etc.

| <p>Councilor Niedergang reported on the items discussed, including the second public hearing on voting rights in municipal elections for 16 and 17-year-olds. 8 people testified, 6 in favor, 1 against, and 1 with neither for nor against. The Committee then discussed the report of the Clean and Open Elections Task Force and its more than 20 recommendations. The Committee asked for the Administration's position, and Mayor's liaison Annie Connors said there were 4 that they would prioritize: recommendations on public financing, using campaign funds for child and elder care services, aligning municipal elections with state elections, and using ranked-choice voting. Councilor White noted that many of these are regulated by the State and would represent major changes in the way voting is done in the Commonwealth, and it could be difficult to move forward on them. The Committee then discussed reducing the terms of Planning and Zoning Board Members to 3 years, from 5. SPCD Director George Proakis expressed support for the 5-year term, and several Councilors favored a 3-year term. Councilors Davis and McLaughlin suggested rolling the change into the Zoning Overhaul, amending the municipal ordinances, and approving a Home Rule Petition to implement the 3-year terms. Lastly, the Committee discussed a strengthened comprehensive Tree Preservation Ordinance, to protect trees on city and private property. Councilor Scott presented slides describing the proposal, and said revenue from fines would go into a tree replacement fund; the maximum fine could be as much as \$14,000. Councilor Niedergang emphasized that the primary intent of regulating tree cutting on private property is to prevent developers from clear-cutting properties, not to affect homeowners or residents.</p> | |

(ID:20727)</p> | <p>Report of the Committee on Licenses and Permits, meeting on April 10, 2019.</p> <p>Councilor Rossetti reported on the meeting. First there was a public hearing on the application by Sam's Falafel and Shawarma, 215 Highland Ave, for an extended operating hours license, to remain open to 3AM. Some residents had concerns about trash and rodents, and owner Sam Edressi said the landlord has agreed to increase trash pickup to 3 times per week, paid for by all of the restaurants in the building. The Committee decided to recommend extending the hours on a 6-month trial to 2AM weekdays and 2:30AM weekends. Next was a show-cause hearing on the renewal of the junk dealer license held by Tosh Enterprises, 260 Elm St. The Committee reviewed a State Police report of owner Michael Bayles's arrest. Mr. Bayles appeared with his attorney, and discussed along with Somerville Police Detective Stephen Jones the nature of the business, and his ongoing cooperation with respect to tracking and reporting the items he takes in, including stolen items. He said he frequently uses an alias, and that's what he did with the State Trooper. City Clerk John Long reported that he has received no documented complaints about the business. Mr. Bayles offered a video of his interaction with the State Trooper, which the Committee was unable to view for technical reasons. Chair Rossetti recommended that the show-cause hearing remain open until the viewing of the video and/or resolution of the criminal complaint, and the Committee recommended renewal on a 2-1 vote,</p> |
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with the hearing kept open. Finally, the Committee discussed the renewal of the outdoor parking license held by Star Market at 275 Beacon St. Councilor Scott expressed concern about the store's negative impact on the neighborhood, and how the turnover of managers means that the same concerns keep cropping up. He said he had spoken with the current store manager, who didn't object to any of the conditions that Councilor Scott proposed. Councilor Scott then proposed approval with those conditions enumerated, noting that the conditions can remain on the license as long as it is issued.
