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Purpose: The purpose of the school based S.A.F.E. and Senior SAFE grants are to support programs that:

• School-based S.A.F.E.

- Provide fire and life safety education to school-aged children in order for them to recognize the dangers of fire, including the fire hazards that smoking-related materials pose.
- Create school partnerships working together to reach the goals and objectives of the state's *Health Education Curriculum Frameworks* and the *Common Core of Learning* through teaching key fire safety behaviors.

Senior SAFE

- Provide fire and life safety education to seniors in order for them to recognize the dangers of fire, poisoning, falls, and other medical emergencies including the fire hazards that smoking related materials pose.
- Create community partnerships and collaborate with the purpose of improving fire and life safety in the homes of seniors.

Priorities: Applications funded through these grants shall address the following priorities:

- Activities that address fire and health hazards of smoking related materials.
- Activities/programs that address the key fire and life safety behaviors addressed in the Massachusetts Public Fire and Life Safety Education Curriculum Planning Guidebook.
- Activities/programs that prevent and reduce fire and burns.
- Have trained fire and life safety educators providing education, training and programming in their communities.

Eligibility: Fire departments are eligible to apply for a Senior SAFE grant, school-based Student Awareness of Fire Education (S.A.F.E.) grant, or S.A.F.E. planning grant per the following guidelines:

- All municipal fire departments/ fire districts may apply for the Senior SAFE grant.
- Cities or towns whose fire department or fire district had a S.A.F.E. program grant in any of the Fiscal Years 2016-2021 are eligible to apply for the school-based S.A.F.E. program grant. Fire departments with ongoing programs may utilize grant resources to enhance their current efforts by adhering to the S.A.F.E. program's guidelines.
- Fire departments or fire districts that have not had an active school-based S.A.F.E. program in any of the Fiscal Years 2016-2021 are eligible to apply for a planning grant.

Planning Grants: School-based S.A.F.E. planning grants will be awarded based on available funds. It is anticipated that \$1,500 will be the award for planning grants. Planning grants can be awarded once, and then fire departments/districts must apply for program grants.

Funding: Departments shall use funds to adopt and carry out fire and life safety education in their communities. One-half of the budget of a school-based S.A.F.E. grant must be devoted to the core school-based program. Senior SAFE is primarily for the education of the senior

population. To be eligible for this grant, the fire department must partner with a community organization that works directly with seniors.

Findings of non-compliance with any portion of the terms of the FY21 S.A.F.E. and Senior SAFE Application, the executed Standard Contract Form, and the DFS Grant Agreement Scope of Work and Budget may result in a demand for funds to be returned to DFS.

The following represents the core mission of the S.A.F.E. program:

The Student Awareness of Fire Education (S.A.F.E.) program is a fire prevention education program designed to equip elementary, intermediate, and high school students with skills for recognizing the dangers of fire, including the fire risks posed by smoking-related materials. The program utilizes specially trained firefighters to teach fire and life safety education. Many of the firefighters are trained emergency medical technicians who have seen the catastrophic health effects of smoking-induced illnesses.

The S.A.F.E. educator serves as a role model for impressionable youth providing students with firsthand knowledge of the dangers associated with fire and age-appropriate information on preventing and surviving those fires that occur. Through a core school-based program, S.A.F.E. educators effect change in the behavior and the safety of the community at large.

The S.A.F.E. Program is designed to create a partnership between the school and fire department. Working jointly to reach the goals and objectives of the state's Curriculum Frameworks and the Common Core of Learning, firefighters teach the Key Fire Safety Behaviors using the *Massachusetts Public Fire and Life Safety Education Curriculum Planning Guidebook* and model teamwork for the students.

Senior S.A.F.E. Mission Statement

The following represents the core mission of the Senior S.A.F.E. program:

The Senior SAFE program is a fire prevention education program designed to improve the fire and life safety of older adults in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts through education that addresses the unique fire risks for this age group. Some of the risks include smoking, home oxygen use, cooking, electrical, and heating dangers. The program utilizes specially trained firefighters to teach fire and life safety education. Many of the firefighters are trained emergency medical technicians who have seen the catastrophic health effects of smoking-induced illnesses and the dangers of fire associated with home medical oxygen use.

Senior SAFE aims to improve the safety of older adult homes. Programs may include the installation of smoke and carbon monoxide alarms, testing and replacing batteries in these devices, the installation and checking of house numbers, installing high-end heat limiting devices on stoves, in-hood stove fire extinguishers, nightlights, and other fall prevention interventions where needed to provide safety for the at-risk older adult population in the community. In addition to installing safety devices, education specific to their circumstances is a crucial component of improving the safety of older adults at home.

The Senior SAFE educator serves as a community leader who can provide firsthand knowledge of the dangers associated with fire, age-appropriate information on preventing and surviving those fires that occur and affect a change in the behavior of older adults.

The Senior SAFE Program is designed to create a partnership between older adults and fire departments through established providers of senior support services such as Councils on Aging, Senior Centers, Visiting Nurse Associations, or other similar agencies.

Budget Narrative for School-Based S.A.F.E. Grants

<u>Fully explain</u> how are you going to spend your **S.A.F.E. grant**. What you will spend your grant on (personnel costs, supplies, etc.)? The S.A.F.E program in Somerville is focuses on fire safety presentations and education primarily to the third grade classrooms throughout the city. Following the fire safety presentations we have focused on evaluating the students using the third grade evaluation test provided by S.A.F.E. The educators provide the students with items such as plastic fire helmets, fire safety literature, heat sensitive color changing pencils.

Somerville Fire is committed to teaching children no only at the third grade level but also students of all ages. Community events are always attended where fire safety literature and giveaways are provided.

Recently we established a new program with the high school science classes with basic fire science methodology and use and operation of fire ext. Also, deployed our recently purchased model tech hazard house for a adaptive learning experience.

Somerville has approximately twenty third grade classrooms and it is our goal to attend one hundred percent of these classrooms with a fire safety presentation, along with an evaluation exam to fifty percent of the students.

Approximately 250 preschool students and kindergarten students were given a presentation geared to their age level.

A new program in regards to teaching basic fire science and use of fire extinguishers to approximately 100 high school students is in the early stages and was highly rated by the teachers.

Program Narrative for School-Based S.A.F.E. Grants Give a full description of the following:

What are the Key Fire Safety Behaviors you will address during the year? Include how you will address the fire risk of **smoking materials (cigarettes, pipes, lighters, matches, etc.)**

The presentations are geared to "Never Play with Matches" with presentations and literature reinforcing the S.A.F.E program curriculum. Also, explained are the health effects of smoking. We continue to reinforce Stop Drop and Roll, knowing two ways out, and Stay Low and Go.

What curricula will you be using?

The curriculum follow the S.A.F.E guidelines as presented through the Massachusetts Public Fire and Safety Education guidebook. An evaluation test is also used for a reference source.

What instructional methods will you be using?

Lecture methods and props are currently used followed by a question and answer session. The presentations include distributing fire safety literature.

In regards to recent evaluations we will be looking to expand to a more adaptive program using audio and visual aids.

What other community events will you be sponsoring or involved with?

Somerville Fire Dept. partners with the three local libraries, we plan to continue reading sessions with the adolescent population. City events such as "Halloween Night and Costume Parade" and "Family Night out at Foss Park are always attended by Somerville Fire. A partnership with Tufts University includes events such as "Read by the River" and "Tufts Family Day."

Presentations are conducted to the third grade classrooms. Following the presentation handouts and literature are distributed. The present teacher is asked to evaluate the class and mail the evaluation to the S.A.F. E coordinator.

Following the Fire Safety presentation we re visit the schools with the S.A.F.E exam for third graders in order to provide the Somerville Fire a skill set to how we can improve our teaching methods. Learning from the positive and negative feedback will ultimately strengthen our program.

Budget and Program Narrative for Senior SAFE Grants Fully explain how you are going to spend your Senior SAFE funds.

What is your plan to address older adult fire safety? (For example: home visits, senior center visits, installations of smoke alarms or other safety devices) Explain.

In partnership with the Council on Aging we continue to install smoke detectors and carbon monoxide alarms for our seniors. We also provide night lights to assist with the potential of falling. Following the installation a safety & fall presentation is conducted. If any other Senior Safety hazards are discovered the educators are advised to correct the issue while at the home visit.

The plan of this year is to get back on track due to COVID and deploy our model tech hazard house at senior S.A.F.E events. Safety presentations will be given to the assisted living facilities and the Senior events.

Describe any training you intend to provide for other SAFE educators and/or non-fire department partners.

The members of the S.A.F.E program will receive training on the newly received Model Tech hazard house. Members will also receive updated training in regards to codes for proper installation of smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

What are the Key Fire Safety Behaviors you will address during the year? List at least 3.

In home hazards and how to prevent and make their home safer including checking for working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

Develop an escape plan geared to your physical and mental abilities along with a family member or caregiver.

Smoke outside and away from combustibles, use a sand bucket to dispose smoking materials.

Stay in the kitchen when using the oven and cooking. Proper cooking methods.

Fully explain how you will work with your partnering agency to deliver fire safety information. The council on Aging currently provides names of seniors in need of smoke and CO alarms. Installers provide safety inspections and are advised to address an unsafe issues.

Members of the SFD also notify the S.A.F.E coordinator if a senior is in need of updated smoke alarms as well as a safety hazard evaluation. The council on aging is notified of the property address.

What instructional methods will you use?

The demonstration method is used to eliminate unsafe fire behavior. Presenters take a proactive approach in order to prevent falls and unsafe behavior.

A record is kept of the address and names of the individuals receiving smoke/CO alarms and the number of alarms received.
