What is Participatory Budgeting?

A democratic process in which community members will directly propose and vote on how to spend \$1,000,000 of public money in Somerville







Project Criteria

Projects that are ideal for Participatory Budgeting:

- Serve a public benefit
- Are limited to a one-time expense (ex: not salaries)
- Can be implemented on city-owned property (ex: not MBTA, state parks)
- And cost less than \$1 million





How does PB work? 5 Stages

PROCESS DESIGN & PLANNING

 Working Group creates policies and procedures, events and materials are developed

IDEA SUBMISSION

 Members of the community are encouraged to submit ideas through various outreach channels

PROPOSAL DEVELOPMENT

 Volunteer Budget Delegates review and consolidate ideas, research, and score final projects to determine which will go on the ballot

VOTING

 Members of the community encouraged to vote on their top 5 out of the final 20

IMPLEMENTATION

 Winning ideas materialize throughout the community


Community involvement at every stage:

- Participatory Budgeting Working Group helps create the process
- Budget Delegates made up of volunteers vet the ideas and turn them into proposals
- All residents of Somerville 12+ (or 6th grade) can submit and vote on ideas

Purpose of the PB Working Group

Establish guidelines and develop a process to roll out participatory budgeting in Somerville in an inclusive, equitable manner. Members will write policies, build outreach and engagement strategies, and create and disseminate informational materials.

All information will be summarized in a final work product, a PB Guidebook.

PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING GUIDEBOOK

GOALS OF PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING

- . The community views this process as fair, open, and democratic.
- We maximize the budget for the people in the community. People have direct influence over how their government spends a portion of their funds for the things that matter to them.

 The community sees that change is possible and that they can bring about change. People feel engaged and that they have the ability to affect local government.

- At least 100 ideas are submitted.
- At least 2,000 votes are received. Participating in the budgeting process is viewed as important and a key element of civic life.
- No voices are missing from the process. The people submitting ideas, conducting community outreach, refining ideas and voting are

representative of the diversity and demographics in Somerville.

That outreach efforts focus particularly on underrepresented groups

VALUES OF THE WORKING GROUP

TRANSPARENCY

We hold currelves accountable to the community of Somerville. Our aim in developing this Guidebook is to share our decision making process in a transparent and accessible way, and to highlight what values we used to guide our choices. Community members are asked to be involved throughout the process, and data on all ideas submitted and final vote tallies will be made publicly available.

INCLUSIVITY

We must ensure all community members are able to access and engage with the process. This should be demonstrated through translation of materials into the five languages of Spanish, Portuguese, Haitian Creole, Nepali, Traditional Chinese, and Simplified Chinese, as well as any accommodations requested through ADA for written content or for in-person events when requested.

EQUITY

A desired outcome is that we can inspire people to be involved in the development of their community. Through our planning, we aim to engage populations who have not previously been involved in the city as well as those in historically disenfranchined groups. This approach will require more effort to solicit ideas and votes in non-traditional channels.

TRUST

This will be a city-wide effort to bring ideas to life and we hope this process builds trust that the city will fulfill its promise to deliver these projects in the community. A clear timeline, with steps to get there, and defined roles for all involved will make the vision a reality.

COMMUNITY

Through careful planning and attention to these values and more, we want all residents in Somerville to be proud that Somerville is a bunching Participatory Budgeting and will join us to celebrate winning ideas once they materialize. We want to demonstrate that Somerville is a community we are lucky to be a part of now, and for generations to come.

Proposal Development Phase

- Committees broken down based on idea submission categories below
- # of ideas per category onto final ballot proportional to the number of ideas submitted, with a minimum of 1 per category

Meeting	Goal	
Orientation (in-person)	Understand timeline, project criteria, select subcommittee	
Meetings #1	Get to know team members, review initial list of ideas, familiarize with relevant materials	
Meetings #2	Begin filling out Project Scope Template, scanning ideas for eligibility, similarities	
Meetings #3	Continue filling out Project Scope Template, scanning ideas for eligibility, similarities, assign members to get site photos if possible, assign if not completed	
Meetings #4	Document ineligible ideas, prepare questions for City Staff	
Meetings #5	Consulting with City Staff	
Meetings #6	Debrief City Staff meeting, select projects for further review, research homework	
Meetings #7	Discuss research, information needed on final proposals	
Meetings #8	Begin scoring final proposals	
Meetings #9	Consulting with City Staff	
Meetings #10	Finalize scoring, select proposals for the ballot, subject to Mayor's approval	

Proposal Scoring

5 points possible for Need, Impact, **Feasibility** Need **Feasibility Impact**

Determining Need

- Does the project already have community support?
 (# of ideas, feedback in other meetings)
- Committee research
- Does the resource exist already or not?

Determining Impact

- # of people who could benefit
- Will an underserved community benefit?
- Is it in a high-use location?
- What is the durability?


Determining Feasibility

- Has the city implemented a similar project?
- · Does it meet criteria?

How to Vote

- Voting online using Stanford's platform
- In-person ballots available in at least City Hall & Public Libraries
- Support from SomerViva, canvassing across the city
- Build on Outreach Methods used in Idea Submission Phase

Top 5 Rank top 5 projects out of 20, projects chosen until funding runs out



What does success look like?

Qualitative


- I am satisfied with the Participatory Budgeting initiative.
