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Greetings Somerville Councilors,

I currently have a drawing studio at 438-rear Somerville Ave, Union. I am writing this letter to address the recent proposal submitted by Rafi Properties/Somernova to change the exis zoning in this area.

I strongly disagree with changing the existing "FAB" zoning in this vicinity.

First, shoe-horning two massive 16 floor edifices into such narrow property footprint just feet away from 438r's 1 ridiculous. The years of construction necessary for such an over-scaled project, constrained by railroad tracks on edge of this property, will abolish essential vehicular load-in/load-out access for established businesses in the 43 Access to Market Basket, a bastion for our diverse neighborhood low-income folks seeking reasonable food pric compromised.

Further, the seismic impact of installing below grade pilings necessary for a building of 16 floor height, will sacr structural integrity of 438r's 1890 structure. This seismic disturbance will also have an adverse influence on the ε Row Cemetery (est.1804), listed on The National Register of Places. The Civil War Monument tower installed in (1863), is considered one the oldest monuments in the world dedicated to Union Soldiers (Somerville Light Infat & the tombstones are delicate & the ground is sacred. Likewise, the shadow impact from Somernova's 3a & 3b p buildings on The Milk Row Cemetery will disrupt existing sunlight/environmental cycles that this section of con has been accustom to for over 200 years.

Lastly, permitting such an enormous development in an area where the existing abutting roof lines do not exceed create *precedence*; enabling & emboldening hastily conceived over-scaled profit driven developments to prolife Somerville community & once again displanting The Arts & Creative Economy.

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Dear Somerville City Government,

As a Somerville resident of 49 years and neighbor to the Somernova zoning proposal, I am extremely concerned about the lack of city overview on this huge project. A big concern is traffic: the streets crossing the tracks approaching this site are bottle necks already at capacity, indicating that the predicted daily trips to and from the proposed buildings would be a preposterous strain on narrow roads.

A further point regards scale: the proposal is for high rise structures totally out of proportion to the surrounding homes. Where is the discussion of HUMAN SCALE? High rise density requires public transportation such as in Union Square, Assembly Square, Brickbottom, and Boynton Yards. Shadow studies may support high building in these areas but not at the old Ames complex.

I am unable to find guidelines as to the limit of acceptable size and traffic under the new zoning label "Climate and Equity Innovation Sub-Area Overlay District". City planning should include focus on preserving a livable city and not be distracted by idealized street photos as seen in the Somernova PR.

Furthermore, I am throughly disappointed at the suggested removal of the Fabrication Zone, a usage I strongly support.

Everyone supports having a Community Center. But the centrally located new high school was advertised as offering community spaces and is the obvious convenient location for young peoples activities.

In conclusion, I ask that you reign in the excessive ambitions of the Somernova proposal by not granting the zoning change.
